A Cautious Cut Can Help Trees Flourish

The recent hacking of four towering rain trees near a white-washed Carambolim church shocked many passers-by and villagers. The pruning in January was carried out to ensure the safety of a balwadi, comunidade house and motorists. However, without the bushy canopy, the landscape lost its green charm.

Many municipal and local bodies oversee bad hacking of trees without expert advice. "If branches are trimmed properly, the exercise can always be repeated for safety reasons instead of hacking them badly at one time," Rozendo Mendonca, a senior horticulturist, said.

Most trees need pruning, at the right time, for rejuvenation. "The dry period is ideal and the cut should be sharp and vertical to prevent dampness. Pathogenic fungi grows on the bleeding wound of trees and can cause dieback - the branch starts dying from the cut portion backwards," Mendonca said.

Trees do not topple over due to old age alone. Hundreds of overgrown trees are uprooted in storms, and scientific

pruning can help protect green cover. "It helps to form new branches and creates a bushy habitat. Trees keep growing straight due to the presence of a plant growth hormone called auxin. Removing the apical tip where auxins are present helps branches or shoots to grow laterally," Maria Fonseca, a botanist, said.

WHY WE NEED TREES

> Trees act as wind-breakers, softening the fury of cyclones

> Air blowing over their leaves becomes cold due to evaporation of water and being heavy, it drops while hot air rises

> Trees halt erosion and are important in mitigating climate change disasters

> They are important in the pollination process, provide honeydew to bees and pollen as food for insects

> Each tree has its own ecosystem, offering shelter to birds as well as safety

> They are bio-indicators of minerals. Presence of certain plants indicates type of



minerals underneath

> Patches of lichens - a combination of algae and fungi - on trees shows there is no pollution in the area



> Plant growth hormones such as auxin and cytokinins play a major role in plants' response to pruning



> Removing auxins can spur lateral or sideways growth of branches and curb growth vertically which is convenient for harvesting produce



> With many medicinal properties, some trees are like pharmacies, waiting to be sourced



Right time to prune trees

Trimming of trees just before the monsoon, or during or immediately after the monsoon exposes the cuts to infections. Micro-organisms, mushrooms, fungi and bacteria can prey on the wound, causing rot to set in. Due to climate change and late rain, pruning from the last week of November to late February is considered ideal to allow healing of wounds. By April, most trees are already showing new growth and pruning may cause more damage than good

Scientific pruning is a must



Without supervision of horticulturists, pruning may cause unnecessary damage to trees. Often, trees are not sprayed with fungicide and aesthetics are ignored. This affects their growth cycle, causes wounds and reduces the trees' life. Experts can advise on pruning

branches and even roots if trees are too close to buildings, saving both. All civic and local bodies should engage experienced horticulturists to protect its green cover

Reasons for trees falling



When trees are top-heavy, the leaf cover is dense or branches are unevenly tilting in one direction, they


become more unstable and vulnerable. Goa has lost hundreds of age-old trees to raging storms due to lack of timely pruning. Dense leaf cover also increases chances of toppling over. Old trees can survive longer with pruning. Trees are also lost in floods due to infection of roots and branches

Precautions that help



The cut on a tree for pruning should be sharp and vertical to

prevent water retention on wounds which may set in the rot. Some alcohol or fungicide should be sprayed on the wound. A piece of plastic may not be required unless under moist conditions as it may later impede growth

Advantages of avenue trees

Streetscape can be improved with a choice of trees. They can serve as buffer zones for ugly spots or waste management sites. If avenue trees are kept small, up to 20 to 25 feet, the chances of their survival are better. Trees along roads and highways provide shade to pedestrians and cool down ambient temperature

Advantages of pruning trees



Pruning translates significantly into conservation and protection of trees. In Goa, massive property losses are reported during monsoon and storms. This damage can be prevented and yield of fruits or crops can be increased. While diseased parts of trees can be removed, increase in canopy area for shade can be ensured, if scientifically done. Importantly, the aesthetics can greatly enhance the streetscape or landscape

State dept moots grants to promote science activities

Panaji: The state department of science and technology will provide grants of up to Rs 50,000 to schools and up to Rs 1 lakh to colleges to conduct science-related seminars, workshops, awareness programmes and exhibitions.

Faculty members, researchers, experts who want to travel abroad to attend events related to science can seek grants of up to Rs 1.5 lakh under the new scheme. Those travelling within the country for workshops, seminars, etc will receive financial support of up to Rs 50,000.

"In case of the Goa State Council for Science and Technology, the maximum grants to be provided for organisation of science seminars, workshops, science fairs is Rs 10 lakh per financial year and for participation in science seminars, exhibitions, science fair, workshops, maximum grants of Rs 10 lakh shall be provided each financial year," states the scheme.

The State Council for Educational Research and Training will also get assi-

stance of up to Rs 10 lakh in a year, while the Goa Science Centre will be provided a maximum of Rs 5 lakh aid per financial year.

"In case of replacement of existing science education vehicles (two medium vehicles), grants shall be provided to selected applicants of the maximum market value of the vehicle with equipment and gadgets. In case of running and maintenance grants for science education vehicles, a maximum of Rs 2.5 lakh for each grantee/vehicle shall be granted for a two-year duration. Total grants for two vehicles shall be Rs 5 lakh," the scheme states.

NGOs and research institutions can also seek a grant of Rs 1 lakh to organise science activities.

A proposal appraisal committee has been formed of experts from the fields of science to scrutinise the proposals. The approved ones will then go to a proposal review committee, which will give the final nod for the grants to be sanctioned.

Twenty-five percent of the proposals to be sanctioned will be reserved for institutions and individuals of the ST community.

Deceptively harmless, danger lurks in various parts of plants

Panaji: An apple a day may keep the doctor away but apple seeds contain a highly toxic substance amygdalin. Potatoes are known to provide cheap carbohydrates and energy, but the green colour is a toxin. A tomato, even raw may be safe to consume, not its stem, which is poisonous.

In a talk on 'Plants that kill' organised by Collaborative Learning Café, botanist and principal of St. Joseph Vaz college, Maria Fonseca said that plants look de-

ceptively harmless. "One part may be edible, but the other poisonous," she said.

Amygdalin in apple seeds releases cyanide and sugar which, on consumption, is converted into hydrogen cyanide. "A few seeds may be harmless but the effect of many can make you sick and even prove lethal," Fonseca said.

A green colour develops in potatoes when they are exposed to light. "This colour and a bitter substance it releases can indicate the presence of toxins," the botanist sa-

id. Similarly with ornamental and wild plants. Their parts or flowers too may be poisonous.

"Some common plants in and around homes to be cautious about are Lantana camera (Ghaneri), Nerium

indicum (Oleander, kaneri). Even their smoke on being burnt can put persons inhaling it in a coma," Fonseca said.

Some of the most dangerous plants are karo, arand, kaner and green thorn apple. Children and pets rather than adults are more vulnerable as curiosity gets the better of them and can prove lethal.

As a form of self defence from bacteria, insects and herbivores, plants naturally produce stings, thorns and chemicals. "Among the che-

micals they produce are calcium oxalate and alkaloids," she said.

Harmful effects on health range from irritation on contact, respiratory problems, dizziness and coma on inhalation, and fatality due to ingestion. The botanist advised participants at the workshop about various aspects of the toxic content of plants, their effects and safety measures.

"There is no thumb rule about a plant's safety. Even military men are trained to identify toxic plants," Fonseca said.

47 species identified in rapid fish count at Chicalim Bay

The ICAR-Central Coastal Agricultural Research Institute (ICAR-CCARI) organised a field day involving a rapid fish count programme in Chicalim Bay and a fishermen-scientist interaction at Khariwadda on March 6.

The event was organised in association with St Joseph Vaz College (Cortalim), Chicalim Biodiversity Management Committee (BMC), Old Cross Fishing Canoe Owners Co-operative Society (Khariwadda) and Goa State Biodiversity Board (GSBB).

An orientation was given to students and staff of the college and fishermen in advance. A total of 30 participants, including students, researchers, fishermen, scientists and local residents, took part in the programme.

The gillnets of different mesh sizes (32, 36, 42, 50 mm of 200 m length) were operated for one hour in the Bay and the catch was taken ashore to

Custodio, a representative of fishermen from Khariwadda stated that this was the first time such an activity is carried out in the State and appreciated the efforts of students, researchers and BMCs. He assured all technical support from the fishermen for such initiatives in future.

A compilation of four research posters displaying the fisheries resources of Goa, technical bulletin and extension folders on ornamental fish culture were also distributed among the fishermen, researchers and students.

The fish count was coordinated by Dr Sreekanth GB, Scientist (FRM), Dr R Solomon Rajkumar, Senior Scientist (Livestock Product Technology) and Dr Trivesh S Mayekar, Scientist (Fish Genetics and Breeding).

Goa coast and assured all support to BMCs and scientists/researchers.

Rui Manuel Cost Araujo, chairman of the Chicalim BMC, explained the activities of the BMC in conservation of the natural resources, utilisation of unutilised/underutilised fallow lands and protection of the coastal biodiversity.

Novel fishing exercise reveals rich fish biodiversity of Chicalim bay

Vasco: In an interesting exercise to showcase the fish biodiversity in Chicalim bay, participants caught and counted 47 fish species and 16 shrimp species.

The fish count coupled with an interaction between fishermen and the scientists on Sunday was organised by the St Joseph Vaz College, Cortalim, in association with Central Coastal Agricultural Research Institute.

Fr Bolmax Pereira of St Joseph Vaz College said that five motorised canoes ventured into the Zuari to catch fish. Although the actual plan was to reach Varek island near St Jacinto island, low tide led the canoes to move to the nearby area and they caught fish there instead, he said.

"During the interaction session we learnt that 47 different varieties of fish and 16 different types of shrimp were

re caught by the local fishermen, which the scientists will be documenting," Bolmax said.

Later, chairman of the Chicalim biodiversity Management Committee Rui Araujo said that fish counting is a one-hour activity, which will be done every month for one year to document and note

down the various fish species found in the Chicalim bay and Zuari river.

On Sunday, after the fishermen came with their catch, ICAR scientists Pravin Kumar and Shrikant explained details about the various species to the students who were a part of this activity.

The activity was backed

by the Goa State Biodiversity Board, Chicalim Biodiversity Management Committee and the Old Cross Fishing Canoe Owner' Cooperative Society.

Chicalim bay is one of the last habitats for the brood stock of the highly prized delicacy but more endangered species of window pane oysters. Though the bivalve had re-emerged in good quantities in recent years, indiscriminate extraction has affected its brood stock again. The lockdown norms had come in handy to stop the haphazard fishing.

The revival in aquatic biodiversity seen after the stoppage of mining activities also yielded a bountiful tisqueo (clam) and kalvam (oyster) crop in mud flats of Chicalim and Sancoale. The mud clam 'kallekhube', which are generally restricted to mangrove habitats, has also in recent years been extracted at low tide from the Chicalim bay.

Church has role to guide flock at elections: Priest

Defending the involvement of the Church during elections, Chicalim Parish Priest Dr Bolmax Pereira on Saturday stated the Church plays the role of researching, sharing and guiding its flock.

He was speaking on "The role that the Church has to play in the run up to assembly elections" at an online session as part of a series of talks on 'Election Fever' organised by the Collaborative Learning Café, a project of the Jesuits and Friends of the Jesuits of the Goa Province.

"The Church has a role to make the community aware of the reality, the burning issues and the danger to the various rights. Hence, forming the conscience of the community so that they decide to vote for after being well informed and having a proper judgement is also a part of this role," said Dr Pereira, who is also assis-

tant professor of Botany at St Joseph Vaz Science College, Cortalim.

"In this context, the Church here plays the role of learning, knowing, researching, sharing and guiding the flock. While the Church appeals to all to come out in big numbers and vote, we should also not vote on None Of The Above (NOTA)."

"We also appeal to voters not to elect defectors who get elected on our votes and then take our votes for granted. The Church also advises not to fall prey to the evils of election by accepting money and gifts in exchange for votes."

"To be objective, look at the bigger picture. Voting is not the time to pay back favours but we are responsible to the

society as we vote," Dr Pereira added.

Speaking on the Ministry of the Church, Dr Pereira said when the Church talks about its role in elections, it is focused on the three roles of Christ as a priest, prophet and king.

"The Church is exercising the priestly ministry through prayer. In fact, the Council for Social Justice and Peace (CSJP) of the archdiocese prepared a prayer after a proper reflection and a ground reality."

"The Church is exercising her ministry of being a prophet, the prophetic role of Christ and thus preparing the people to exercise their franchise in a better way. This prophetic role is exercised through awareness and guidance by trying to prepare the candidates to exercise their kingly role through service."

The event was followed by a question-and-answer session with the participants.

Goan mando wins global audience

Over the years, be it for weddings, anniversaries or any ceremonious occasions, 'mando' followed by 'dulpods' has always been part and parcel of the Goan lifestyle. No occasion would ever conclude on a musical note, without a traditional mando and those satirical dulpods.

Today, for festive occasions, especially in the Goan Catholic households, it might have become a rarity. But nevertheless, at the wedding reception the common and catchy 'dulpods' can still be heard from the band in attendance. And then, its nostalgia that follows or the one rendering them from a platform and the audience listening and tapping their feet on the dancing floor.

Before the Goan 'mando' and 'dulpods' becomes a rarity and results in natural extinction, for the past 40-odd years the Goa Cultural and Social Centre, a recipient of Goa state cultural award, has been striving hard to preserve this rich Goan heritage. And the only way the centre thought befitting was by organizing a mando festival annually.

Since 1965 this festival came into existence with Club Nacional organizing it initially, followed

by Clube Nacional and Konkani Bhasha Mandal. The Goa Cultural and Social Centre took over in 1974 and continued shouldering the responsibility with equal zeal and enthusiasm till date.

The cultural centre has come organizing this festival with active participation of various social and cultural groups and clubs from different villages, both in north and south Goa. And their active involvement has only motivated many others to follow, thus keeping the age-old Goan tradition alive.

On account of the Covid-19 pandemic, the centre couldn't organize the festival last year. But following all the SOPs, the centre took the lead and organized it this year, with involvement of six groups (only the seniors), excluding the children and teenagers' groups.

The uniqueness of this year's festival was the livestreaming of the event for the first time, resulting in bigger viewership from across the globe. Elaborating more about this new plan, the general secretary, Milagres Fernandes said, "Considering the present scenario of the pandemic, we thought of livestreaming the event and reaching out to a wider audience over the world." The



event for two consecutive days, namely December 9-10, was easily available on YouTube and Facebook, thus bringing in more than 2,000 viewers, especially those abroad," he added.

"With limited entry at the venue," Fernandes said, "the online response was overwhelming from all 'mando' lovers across the globe." Considering the positive response from the online viewers, he said that the committee may consider

continuing with the same trend in the years to come.

Fr Kelwin Monteiro SJ, who is currently pursuing his Ph.D on the mando festival, said, "As part of my studies, I have visited most of these performing groups during their practice sessions. It is very impressive to witness the journey that these groups have gone through, from their first practice to their final performance." "Despite having very little time

to prepare, unlike previous years, and the Covid scare, all six participant groups put in their best performances," he added. "This year, for the first time, since 1965, the festival was also streamlined," Fr Monteiro mentioned. "This livestreaming of the mando festival is a big feather in the organizers' cap. I believe that for the good of the 'mando', a rich heritage of Goa, and for the greater benefit of the Goans overseas, this new

beginning should continue in the years to come. From the livestreaming chat notes, I could feel the sense of nostalgia that Goans experienced, whilst they watched live the mando fest."

"As expected," Fr Monteiro said, "the dulpods at the festival focused on the themes that affect the Goan lives, namely Covid, lockdown, price rise, elections, Mollem heritage, 3-linear projects, etc." "This year, the fact that despite not

having age-based categories, most participants were from the younger generation certainly speaks of a bright future for this musical tradition in Goa," he concluded.

Fr Bolmax Pereira, who has been closely associated with mandos by his involvement with groups 'Kepemchim Kirmnam', followed by 'St Xavier's Kolejicho Nad' and lately with 'Sant Juze Vazachim Pavlam', Cortalim, said that mandos need to be preserved for posterity as it helps to preserve our unique Goan heritage. "We are slowly losing our rich heritage due to new techno music. Consequently, considering the globalization," he said, "our original mando is dying. Due to new genre music, we may tend to lose our age-old mando."

As an assistant professor of botany at St Joseph Vaz College, Cortalim, Fr Pereira was instrumental in roping in the students and teaching staff in the mando presentation, before the pandemic. "But this year," he said, "it was only the teaching staff involved in the show. More youth have to come forward to learn this traditional art. If you teach them, they are willing and ready to learn from you."
